Arnold refers to her paintings as "autobiographical," noting that "it all ties into the overlapping of life experience and memory and imagination. They all get mixed together and come out as they will," giving Arnold's work a dream-like quality. In this piece, Arnold has used her favorite medium, encaustic (dry pigment mixed with hot beeswax), which adds a sense of texture and depth to the work. *Encausic may expand and contract with temperature. This painting should not be hung in direct sunlight.*

Fox parent and inventor, Paul Hayes, has created this unique console using $16 \frac{1}{2}$ " plate steel, which he electroplated with copper, buffed, and coated.
